Voppie's Views

This fall, I studied through the book of Ezekiel. What a powerful and thought-provoking book! Even now, I find myself reflecting on the lessons I learned during my study. For those who wish to dive deeper into Ezekiel, I highly recommend the two commentaries I reference below. Both are accessible, clear, and geared toward ordinary readers who want to explore Ezekiel in greater depth.

Ezekiel was a prophet in Babylon, having been carried away during the second wave of the Babylonian conquest. His messages were directed to his fellow Israelites who remained in Jerusalem and its surrounding regions. These messages were urgent warnings: "It's not too late to repent!" Ezekiel called on his people to turn away from their sinful ways and return to God. He assured them that God was still willing to redeem and rescue them.

At the same time, Ezekiel also addressed the "fake news" circulating from the prophets in Jerusalem. The false prophets were giving unfounded assurance that God would never allow Jerusalem, especially the temple, to be destroyed. This was in stark contrast to the prophecies of Jeremiah and Ezekiel himself, who repeatedly warned that judgment was imminent. The people of Jerusalem had refused to acknowledge their sins and their disregard for God's holiness. They had been blinded by pride, believing that as God's chosen people, they were somehow exempt from the consequences of their actions.

In addition to feeling exempt from God's discipline, the people were grumbling about God not being fair for the trouble they already faced with the two previous invasions and deportations. They felt it was unjust if they withstood "the worst of God's wrath" for the sins of their ancestors. While their ancestors had rebelled, the people Ezekiel wrote to were facing God's judgement for their *own* actions. Each generation is accountable for its own sin. In the first part of Ezekiel 18, God makes this abundantly clear. Salvation is not about being God's "chosen people" or about being raised the "right community." Salvation is about repentance and faith.

In the latter half of Ezekiel 18, God pleads with His people to repent. He takes no pleasure in the death of anyone (Ezekiel 18:23). As Dowden writes, "All that God expects from His people, He provides for them. The only way to 'get' a new spirit and a new heart is to go to God" (p. 101). Throughout Ezekiel and the writings of other prophets, the consistent call is for sinners to come to God for cleansing. Repentance, according to Ezekiel, involves a deep, genuine sorrow for sin which leads to a transformed heart, a new desire to obey God, and a deeper hunger to know Him more. (Ezekiel 36:26-27)

Ezekiel's message is one we still need to hear today. Just as the people of Judah rejected their accountability to a holy God, many people today continue to live as though they are beyond the reach of divine judgment. Ezekiel's warnings serve as a reminder "Therefore, I will judge you, O house of Israel, every one according to his ways, declares the Lord GOD.

Repent and turn from all your transgressions, lest iniquity be your ruin.

Cast away from you all the transgressions that you have committed and make yourselves a new heart and a new spirit!

Why will you die, O house of Israel?

For I have no pleasure in the death of anyone, declares the Lord GOD; so, turn, and live."

Ezekiel 18:30-32

they are beyond the reach of divine judgment. Ezekiel's warnings serve as a reminder that no one is exempt from standing before God to account for their choices. As Dowden writes, "The people of Judah did not just need to be rescued from Babylon; they needed to be rescued from their sins" (p. 98).

Ezekiel's call to repentance is not only for the people of his time but also for us today. As believers, we are charged with calling others to abandon the path of destruction and choose the path of life. I often ask myself: Is God's passionate call to sinners, as expressed through Ezekiel, clearly heard through me? If not, what's holding me back? It's a challenge worth reflecting on.


