The Youth Group made our trek to Elkhart, Indiana July 5-9th to volunteer at SonSet Solutions with Tim and Renee Zook. Though the travel time was longer than usual, the memories made were extra special! We had a smaller group from the youth go: 4 sponsors and 3 teens. The Quick Family was also able to join us during our volunteer time at Sonset Solutions.

While at SonSet, we helped with many different projects, including taking apart old radio equipment and sorting metals for recycling, installing parking bumpers in the parking lot, hanging dry erase boards, and cleaning up inside and outside the building. On Friday, we tested and packed 480 radios to be shipped to one of their partner radio stations in Zambia.

Thursday night, we ate at Tim and Renee's house. It was a beautiful evening, so we were able to sit outside in their backyard to eat. Friday night, we ate in Shipshewana at an Amish couple's house with the SonSet Solutions crew. We were blessed with as much food as we could eat. On the menu was fresh bread with jam and peanut butter, meatloaf, grilled chicken, salad, green beans, mashed potatoes and gravy, buttered noodles, and three types of pie! It was a feast!!

Saturday, we went to Lake Michigan. A few of us braved the chilly waters and played in the lake then we hiked up one of the sand dunes. We finished out the afternoon playing mini golf and riding go carts.

During our trip, we studied sections of Paul's letters. Discussing what it means to be saved, being used by God no matter our past, and making the conscious decision to live for God rather than for man.



What do you do when you're blindsided by unexpected life events? Maybe you live with a long-standing unmet expectation. Perhaps a prayer wasn't answered in the way you wanted or at the time you desired. Have you ever wondered if it's okay to question God?

In Psalm 74, the Psalmist reflects on the conquest and destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple. As he views the devastation, Asaph pens a poignant Psalm that is a gift to us centuries later! I don't get the sense that Asaph is angrily shaking his fist at God in unbelief, rather I get the sense that he is a dedicated follower of God who is overwhelmed with grief, asking anguished questions:

O God, why have you rejected us so long? Why is your anger so intense against the sheep of your own pasture? Remember that we are the people you chose long ago, the tribe you redeemed as your own special possession! And remember Jerusalem, your home here on earth. Psalms 74:1-2 (NLT)

Asaph feels the heat of God's wrath. In distress, he asks God to remember. Does God forget? No, but Asaph needs to express his deep sense of abandonment as he reminds God that Israel is His specially chosen covenant people. Asaph asks God to remember that He chose Israel out of the nations and names them His "special possession."

I picture Asaph slowly walking through the smoldering ruins.

Walk through the awful ruins of the city; see how the enemy has destroyed your sanctuary. There your enemies shouted their victorious battle cries; there they set up their battle standards. They swung their axes like woodcutters in a forest. With axes and picks, they smashed the carved paneling. They burned your sanctuary to the ground. They defiled the place that bears your name. Then they thought, "Let's destroy everything!" So they burned down all the places where God was worshiped. We no longer see your miraculous signs. All the prophets are gone, and no one can tell us when it will end. Psalms 74:3-9

God seems profoundly absent in the middle of this extreme trial. Asaph asks God to walk with him through the debris and see the decimation of God's own sanctuary. Asaph points out that nobody knows how or when this will end. Don't you feel like that in a hard trial? I sure do! We want God to stand in the chaos with us, to see what we are seeing and to feel what we are feeling. Aren't you glad our God does this? (Hebrews 4:14-16)

More questions tumble out of Asaph:

How long, O God, will you allow our enemies to insult you? Will you let them dishonor your name forever? Why do you hold back your strong right hand? Unleash your powerful fist and destroy them. Psalms 74:10-11

Why God is allowing all this to happen, will it ever end, and where is God's power to defend His people? Can't you identify? Is your first impulse to take your questions to God? I hope it is, because God understands your questions and encourages you to seek His face in your pain. God already knows all your thoughts; He is ready for a conversation with you!

Then Asaph recalls the greatness of God.

You, O God, are my king from ages past, bringing salvation to the earth. You split the sea by your strength and smashed the heads of the sea monsters. You crushed the heads of Leviathan and let the desert animals eat him. You caused the springs and streams to gush forth, and you dried up rivers that never run dry. Both day and night belong to you; you made the starlight and the sun. You set the boundaries of the earth, and you made both summer and winter. Psalms 74:12-17

Asaph then asks God to remember and respect His Covenant with His people.

See how these enemies insult you, Lord. A foolish nation has dishonored your name. Don't let these wild beasts destroy your turtledoves. Don't forget your suffering people forever. Remember your covenant promises, for the land is full of darkness and violence! Don't let the downtrodden be humiliated again. Instead, let the poor and needy praise your name. Arise, O God, and defend your cause. Remember how these fools insult you all day long. Don't overlook what your enemies have said or their growing uproar. Psalms 74:18-23

Asaph asks God to act not only out of compassion for His people, but also out of concern for His Glory. He asks God to rebuke the invaders who are mocking God because they are dishonoring the Holy Name of God. Like Asaph, we can know with certainty that God does not, and will not allow His Name to be slandered. Neither will God aban-

don His people! This God is OUR God too!! He will always accomplish

His purposes. Like Asaph, we can trust our God in every season

and in every situation!
