Liuda Statkevich (FCA Ukrainian Staff member) and Emma (Sasha's 10-year-old daughter) led our children in Ukrainian songs, culture, crafts and snacks during the Kids' Sunday School hour.

Throughout the Worship Service, Scot Loyd led Joe and Denise, Liuda and Sasha in a panel discussion, taking written questions from the congregation. It was a fantastic morning, filled with great fellowship and valuable information.

Sasha Aleksandrov, (FCA Ukraine National Director) his wife Marina and their three children, (Emma, Theo and May) were able to spend a Sunday morning with us, sharing their story. In February 2022, they came to the USA for a two-week trip to attend an FCA seminar in Dallas. While here, the war erupted in Ukraine, and they were unable to return. They shared with us that their chapter in States is coming to an end as it's now time to return. Their family has been praying, following God's lead and will be returning to Ukraine to continue develop and leading the FCA ministry in their country. God has put in their hearts, a love for ministering to coaches and athletes, they know that it's His calling for our lives. God is using this verse to speak to Sasha and his family, "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I. Send me!" - Isaiah 6:8. They still believe that all 80,000 Ukrainian coaches need to be led and ministered to, as they in turn influence 4 million kids who deserve to hear the Gospel, receive a Bible and be a part of an FCA huddle.

Sasha and Marina just received a passport for baby May, who was born in the Sates on May 26. They plan to start their trip back home August 23, 2023, returning to their hometown in west Ukraine. 

Vonnie's Views

November 14, 2020, started out like any other Saturday. I spent the day doing weekend housework. But I felt tired all day. By the afternoon I was pretty sure I was coming down with something. In the evening when I went to bed, I felt like I might be catching a cold. I grabbed the Mentholatum to apply to my neck because my throat was getting sore. With a jolt, I realized the distinctive scent of the ointment was absent. I handed the tiny green bottle to Gerhard and asked him if he could smell it—he confirmed he could. I held it to my nose and inhaled deeply. Nothing. That was the moment I realized I likely had COVID. A test the following Monday confirmed.

Although the course of the illness was mild, the loss of taste and smell was profound. Weeks passed as I waited for my taste and smell to return. It did not. Months passed and I started to try the home remedies I read about on the internet. Nothing changed. A year passed and I grappled with the fact that I may be among those who never regain their taste and smell.

In the nearly 3 years I've been without taste and smell, there have been intervals when everything tastes either sweet, salty, or metallic. There have been times when I constantly smell something that is not there, like cigarette smoke. Other times, the smell of something familiar has changed into an unpleasant scent. For example, for a month or so, coffee suddenly smelled like gasoline. I've also had beautiful moments when I get a whiff of "normal" smells, like bread baking in my oven. But then as quickly as I smell it, it's gone.

In the realm of disabilities, the loss of taste and smell is minor. I can live a full and meaningful life without being able to taste or smell. I must be aware that some warnings are absent: smell of smoke, the acrid smell of a hot belt on the mower, or the smell of the gas being inadvertently left on in the stove.

This disability of not being able to taste or smell has caused me to think more deeply about a couple of things. First, I often feel dissatisfied and unfulfilled after a meal. I've eaten and my tummy is full—but I am restless and want more. Psalm 34:8 says, "Oh, taste and see that the LORD is good! Blessed is the man who takes refuge in him!" When I'm feeling dissatisfied and unfilled, when I roam around my kitchen looking for something—anything—that will satisfy my discontent, I remind myself of Psalm 40:5 "LORD my God, no one can compare with you. You have done many miracles. And you plan to do many more for us. There are too many of them for me to talk about." The miracle I'm asking God for is that HE ALONE will be my satisfaction. I truly want to taste and see that the Lord is GOOD. I pray that I will hunger and thirst after righteousness (Matthew 5:6) because then, and only then, I will be entirely satisfied.

Second, I long for these senses to be restored and I grieve their loss. It's normal and healthy to grieve what is lost. But when that loss becomes that focal point of our lives, we have entered dangerous territory—territory where our adversary is able to gain a foothold. We all should grieve the brokenness of this world because of sin, keeping in mind that the beauty of redemption shines brightly in brokenness! We also must realize that "this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison" (2 Corinthians 4:17)! Our challenging circumstances can produce good fruit in our lives and remind us of what matters eternally. Isaiah 25:26 says, "On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wine, of rich food full of marrow, of aged wine well refined." The angel told John to write, "Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb" (Revelation 19:9). All who have accepted salvation by grace through faith are invited. I'm eagerly looking forward to that day! But in the meantime, I will feast on the goodness of God and his marvelous provision during my sojourn on earth!
